## Exercise 18A

## 1. Question

Write order and degree (if defined) of each of the following differential equations:
$\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{4}+3 y\left(\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}\right)=0$

## Answer

The order of a differential equation is the order of the highest derivative involved in the equation. So the order comes out to be 2 as we have $\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}$ and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised. So the power at this order is 1.

So the answer is 2,1 .

## 2. Question

Write order and degree (if defined)of each of the following differential equations:
$x^{3}\left(\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}\right)^{2}+x\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{4}=0$

## Answer

The order of a differential equation is the order of the highest derivative involved in the equation. So the order comes out to be 2 as we have $\frac{\mathrm{d}^{2} \mathrm{y}}{\mathrm{dx}^{2}}$ and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised. So the power at this order is 2 .

So the answer is 2, 2 .

## 3. Question

Write order and degree (if defined) of each of the following differential equations:
$\left(\frac{\mathrm{d}^{2} \mathrm{~s}}{\mathrm{dt}^{2}}\right)^{2}+\left(\frac{\mathrm{ds}}{\mathrm{dt}}\right)^{3}+4=0$

The order of a differential equation is the order of the highest derivative involved in the equation. So the order comes out to be 2 as we have $\frac{\mathrm{d}^{2} \mathrm{~s}}{\mathrm{dt}^{2}}$ and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised.
So the power at this order is 2.
So the answer is 2,2 .

## 4. Question

Write order and degree (if defined)of each of the following differential equations:
$\left(\frac{d^{3} y}{d x^{3}}\right)^{2}+\left(\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}\right)^{3}+\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{4}+y^{5}=0$

## Answer

The order of a differential equation is the order of the highest derivative involved in the equation. So the order comes out to be 3 as we have $\frac{d^{3} y}{d x^{3}}$ and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised. So the power at this order is 2 .

So the answer is 3, 2 .

## 5. Question

Write order and degree (if defined)of each of the following differential equations:

$$
\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}+\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}+2 y=0
$$

## Answer

The order of a differential equation is the order of the highest derivative involved in the equation. So the order comes out to be 2 as we have $\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}$ and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised.
So the power at this order is 1.
So the answer is 2,1 .

## 6. Question

Write order and degree (if defined)of each of the following differential equations:
$\frac{d y}{d x}+y=e^{x}$

## Answer

The order of a differential equation is the order of the highest derivative involved in the equation. So the order comes out to be 1 as we have $\frac{d y}{d x}$ and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised.
So the power at this order is 1 . Also, the equation has to be a polynomial, but here the exponential function does not take any derivative with this. Hence it is a polynomial.

So the answer is 1,1 .

## 7. Question

Write order and degree (if defined)of each of the following differential equations:
$\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}+y^{2}+e^{(d y / d x)}=0$

## Answer

The order of a differential equation is the order of the highest derivative involved in the equation. So the order comes out to be 2 as we have $\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}$ and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised.
But here when we open the series of $e^{x}$ as $1+\frac{x}{1!}+\frac{x^{2}}{2!}+\frac{x^{3}}{3!}+-------$. Also, the equation has to be polynomial. Therefore the degree is not defined. Also, the equation has to be a polynomial, but opening the exponential function will give undefined power to the highest derivative, so the degree of this function is not defined.

So the answer is 2 , not defined .

## 8. Question

Write order and degree (if defined)of each of the following differential equations:
$\frac{d y}{d x}+\sin \left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)=0$

## Answer

The order of a differential equation is the order of the highest derivative involved in the equation. So the order comes out to be 1 as we have $\frac{d y}{d x}$ and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised. But when we open $\operatorname{Sin} x$ as $x-\frac{x^{3}}{3!}+\frac{x^{5}}{5!}-\frac{x^{7}}{7!}+----$. Also, the equation has to be polynomial, and opening thus, Sin function will lead to an undefined power of the highest derivative. Therefore the degree is not defined.

So the answer is 1 , not defined.

## 1. Question

Write order and degree (if defined)of each of the following differential equations:

$$
\frac{d^{4} y}{d x^{4}}-\cos \left(\frac{d^{3} y}{d x^{3}}\right)=0
$$

## Answer

The order of a differential equation is the order of the highest derivative involved in the equation. So the order comes out to be 4 as we have $\frac{d^{4} y}{d x^{4}}$ and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised. But when we open the Cos $x$ series, we get $1-\frac{x^{2}}{2!}+\frac{x^{4}}{4!}-\frac{x^{6}}{6!}+-\cdots$. This leads to an undefined power on the highest derivative. Therefore the deg9ee of this function becomes undefined.

So the answer is 4 , not defined.

## 10. Question

Write order and degree (if defined) of each of the following differential equations:
$\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}+5 x\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}-6 y=\log x$

## Answer

The order of a differential equation is the order of the highest derivative involved in the equation. So the order comes out to be 2 as we have $\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}$ and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised. So the power at this order is 1 . Because the logarithm function is not at any derivative, so it doesn't destroy the polynomial.Hence degree is 1

So the answer is 2,1 .

## 11. Question

Write order and degree (if defined)of each of the following differential equations:
$\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{3}-4\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}+7 y=\sin x$

## Answer

The order of a differential equation is the order of the highest derivative involved in the equation. So the
order comes out to be 1 as we have $\frac{d y}{d x}$ and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised. So the power at this order is 3 . Because the Sine function is not at any derivative, so it doesn't destroy the polynomial. Hence the degree is 3 .

So the answer is 1,3 .

## 12. Question

Write order and degree (if defined)of each of the following differential equations:
$\frac{d^{3} y}{d x^{3}}+2 \frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}+\frac{d y}{d x}=0$

## Answer

The order of a differential equation is the order of the highest derivative involved in the equation. So the order comes out to be 3 as we have $\frac{d^{3} y}{d x^{3}}$ and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised. So the power at this order is 1 .

So the answer is 3,1 .

and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised. So the power at this order is 2 .
So the answer is $2 / 3,2$.

## 15. Question

\sqrt{1-y^{2}} d x+\sqrt{1-x^{2}} d y=0
$$

## Answer

The order of a differential equation is the order of the highest derivative involved in the equation. So, the order comes out to be 1 as we have $\sqrt{1-y^{2}} d x+\sqrt{1-x^{2}} d y=0$
$\frac{d y}{d x}=-\frac{\sqrt{1-y^{2}}}{\sqrt{1-x^{2}}}$
and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised. So the power at this order is 1.
So the answer is 1,1 .

## 16. Question

Write order and degree (if defined)of each of the following differential equations:
$\left(\mathrm{y}^{\prime \prime}\right)^{3}+\left(\mathrm{y}^{\prime}\right)^{2}+\sin \mathrm{y}^{\prime}+1=0$

and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised. So the power at this order is 1.
So the answer is 1,1 .

## 18. Question

$y=\frac{d y}{d x}+\frac{5}{\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)}$

## Answer

Given: $y=\frac{d y}{d x}+\frac{5}{\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)}$
Solving, we get,
$y \times \frac{d y}{d x}=\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}+5$
Now,
The order of a differential equation is the order of the highest derivative involved in the equation. So, the order comes out to be 2 as we have, $y \times \frac{d y}{d x}=\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}+5$
and the degree is the highest power to which a derivative is raised. So the power at this order is 1.
So the answer is 2,1 .

## Exercise 18B

## 1. Question

Verify that $x^{2}=2 y^{2} \log y$ is a solution of the differential equation $\left(x^{2}+y^{2}\right) \frac{d y}{d x}-x y=0$.

## Answer

Given $x^{2}=2 y^{2} \log y$
On differentiating both sides with respect to $x$, we get
$2 x=2(2 y) \log y\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)+2 y^{2}\left(\frac{1}{y}\right) \frac{d y}{d x}$
$x=(2 y) \log y\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)+2 y\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)$
$x=\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)((2 y) \log y+y)$
Multiply both sides with y
$x y=\left(2 y^{2} \log y+y^{2}\right) \frac{d y}{d x}$
We know, $x^{2}=2 y^{2} \log y$. So replace $2 y^{2} \log y$ with $x^{2}$ in the above equation.
$x y=\left(x^{2}+y^{2}\right) \frac{d y}{d x}$
$\left(x^{2}+y^{2}\right) \frac{d y}{d x}-x y=0$
Conclusion: Therefore $x^{2}=2 y^{2} \log y$ is the solution of $\left(x^{2}+y^{2}\right) \frac{d y}{d x}-x y=0$

## 1. Question

Conclusion: Therefore, $\mathrm{y}=\mathrm{e}^{\mathrm{x}} \cos \mathrm{bx}$ is not the solution of $\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}-2 \frac{d y}{d x}+2 y$

## 2. Question

## Answer

Given $y=e^{(m) \cos ^{-1} x}$
On differentiating with x , we get
$\frac{d y}{d x}=e^{(m) \cos ^{-1} x}(m)\left(\frac{-1}{\sqrt{1-x^{2}}}\right)=\frac{-y m}{\sqrt{1-x^{2}}}$
On differentiating again with x , we get
$\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}=\frac{y m^{2}}{1-x^{2}}-\frac{m x}{\left(\sqrt{\left.1-x^{2}\right)\left(1-x^{2}\right)}\right.}$
We want to find $\left(1-x^{2}\right) \frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}-2 \frac{d y}{d x}-m^{2} y$
$=y m^{2}-\frac{m x y}{\sqrt{1-x^{2}}}+\frac{y m x}{\sqrt{1-x^{2}}}-m^{2} y$
$=0$
Therefore, $y=e^{(m) \cos ^{-1} x}$ is the solution of $\left(1-x^{2}\right) \frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}-2 \frac{d y}{d x}-m^{2} y$
Conclusion: Therefore, $y=e^{(m) \cos ^{-1} x}$ is the solution of

We want to find $\left(1-x^{2}\right) \frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}-2 \frac{d y}{d x}-m^{2} y$
$=y m^{2}-\frac{m x y}{\sqrt{1-x^{2}}}+\frac{y m x}{\sqrt{1-x^{2}}}-m^{2} y$
$=0$
Therefore, $y=e^{(m) \cos ^{-1} x}$ is the solution of $\left(1-x^{2}\right) \frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}-2 \frac{d y}{d x}-m^{2} y$

$\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}=2 b e^{2 x}+2 b e^{2 x}+4(a+b x) e^{2 x}$
Now let's see what is the value of $\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}-4 \frac{d y}{d x}+4 y$
$=2 b e^{2 x}+2 b e^{2 x}+4(a+b x) e^{2 x}-4 b e^{2 x}-8(a+b x) e^{2 x}+4(a+b x) e^{2 x}$
$=0$
Conclusion: Therefore, $y=(a+b x) e^{2 x}$ is the solution of $\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}-4 \frac{d y}{d x}+4 y=0$

## 4. Question

Verify that $y=(a+b x) e^{2 x}$ is the general solution of the differential equation $\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}-4 \frac{d y}{d x}+4 y=0$.

## Answer

Given $y=(a+b x) e^{2 x}$

$=2 b e^{2 x}+2 b e^{2 x}+4(a+b x) e^{2 x}-4 b e^{2 x}-8(a+b x) e^{2 x}+4(a+b x) e^{2 x}$
$=0$
Conclusion: Therefore, $y=(a+b x) e^{2 x}$ is the solution of $\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}-4 \frac{d y}{d x}+4 y=0$

$+e^{x}(-A \cos x-B \sin x)$
Now let's see what is the value of $\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}-2 \frac{d y}{d x}+2 y$
$=e^{x}(A \cos x+B \sin x)+e^{x}(-A \sin x+B \cos x)+e^{x}(-A \sin x \oplus B \cos x)$

## Answer

Given $y=A \cos 2 x-B \sin 2 x$
On differentiating with x , we get
$\frac{d y}{d x}=-2 A \sin 2 x-2 B \cos 2 x$
On differentiating again with x , we get
$\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}=-4 A \cos 2 x+4 B \sin 2 x$
Now let's see what is the value of $\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}+4 y$

$\left(x \frac{d y}{d x}-x+x+y \frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}+\left(y \frac{d y}{d x}-y-x-y \frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}=\left(x+y \frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}$
$\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}(x+y)^{2}+(-y-x)^{2}=\left(x+y \frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}$
$\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}(x+y)^{2}+(y+x)^{2}=\left(x+y \frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}$
Rearranging the above equation
$(x+y)^{2}\left\{\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}+1\right\}=\left(x+y \frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}$

$(x)^{2}+(y-h)^{2}=a^{2}+h^{2}$, where $a$ is an arbitrary constants.
$x^{2}+(y-h)^{2}=a^{2}+h^{2}(1)$
Differentiating the above equation with respect to x on both sides, we have,
$2(x)+2(y-h) \frac{d y}{d x}=0$
$x-h \frac{d y}{d x}+y \frac{d y}{d x}=0$
$h=\frac{x+y \frac{d y}{d x}}{\frac{d y}{d x}}$
Substituting the value of a in equation (1)
$x^{2}+\left(y-\frac{x+y \frac{d y}{d x}}{\frac{d y}{d x}}\right)^{2}=a^{2}+\left(\frac{x+y \frac{d y}{d x}}{\frac{d y}{d x}}\right)^{2}$
$x^{2}+\left(\frac{y \frac{d y}{d x}-x-y \frac{d y}{d x}}{\frac{d y}{d x}}\right)^{2}=a^{2}+\left(\frac{x+y \frac{d y}{d x}}{\frac{d y}{d x}}\right)^{2}$

Equation of the family of parabolas having a vertex at the origin and axis along positive $y$-axis can be represented by

Differentiating the above equation with respect to $\times$ on both sides, we have,
$2(x)=4(a) \frac{d y}{d x}$

Rearranging the above equation
$x y \frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}+x\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}-y \frac{d y}{d x}=0$

$x y \frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}+\frac{d y}{d x}\left(\frac{d y}{d x} x-y \frac{d x}{d x}\right)=0$
Rearranging the above equation
$x y \frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}+x\left(\frac{d y}{d x}\right)^{2}-y \frac{d y}{d x}=0$
